THE VARIABLE DENSITY TUNNEL was dedicated as a National Historic Landmark Exhibit in a ceremony October 10 at the H.J.E. Reid Conference Center. Unveiling a plaque commemorating the exhibit are, from left, Dr. Harry A. Butowsky, a National Park Service research historian; Center Director Paul F. Holloway; and W.R. Phillips, executive vice president of Newport News Shipbuilding. Butkowsky called the tunnel "NASA's most consequential National Historic Landmark." Said Butowsky: "The Variable Density Tunnel was the first facility to establish the NACA as a technologically competent organization and led to the construction of superior aircraft that dominated the airways." The VDT was built by Newport News Shipbuilding and delivered to Langley in February, 1922. Proposed by Max M. Munk, Langley's German aerodynamicist, the tunnel allowed the testing of small-scale models at full-scale values in the low-speed range.
